TO YOU

- CME credits. Physicians, nurse practitioners, and other health professionals may claim Category II credits, and PAs may claim Category I or II credits.
- Tuition remission. Preceptors can request a tuition waiver that is good for three credits of Chatham coursework, graduate or undergraduate, online or on-campus (excluding physician assistant, physical therapy, and occupational therapy courses).
- Enhance your knowledge base. Preceptors report that they appreciate the opportunity to revisit topics and details that are not part of everyday practice and staying up-todate with current recommendations and quidelines.
- Strengthen your leadership skills and explore the role of a healthcare educator.
 Precepting not only allows you to give back to the profession—it can help you advance your career.
- University affiliation. Your Clinical Assistant Professor appointment comes with a Chatham e-mail account, ID card (with access to Chatham's Athletic and Fitness Center and library, and faculty rates at sponsored concerts and lectures).

TO YOUR PRACTICE

- Having PA students can increase patient satisfaction. While you see returning patients, a student can perform new patient intakes and exams, decreasing the amount of time that patients sit in waiting rooms.
- Tuition discount to all employees at your site. Chatham extends a 20% tuition discount to all employees of organizations that host Chatham students for clinical rotations. The discount applies to a range of programs, including fully online RN-BSN, MSN, and DNP nursing programs; an online MBA with Healthcare Management concentration; a Master of Accounting; online bachelor completer programs in business administration and many more.
- Early look at the talent. It's not at all uncommon for Chatham PA students to receive job offers from a clinical rotation site. And even if your site isn't currently hiring, it's often useful to see what new graduates can bring to the table.

OF SELECTING CHATHAM

The problem-based learning (PBL) focus of Chatham's MPAS program means that students are exceptionally well-prepared to hit the ground running in their clinical rotations. Unlike students who have received most of their education through lectures, Chatham students come to rotation with a year's worth of:

- Simulated interactions, including patient exams, patient interviewing, patient education, and patient presentations to preceptors
- Experience working in a team to problemsolve
- Competence in navigating evidence-based medical resources
- Practice receiving and implementing constructive feedback on all aspects of their clinical rotation preparation and performance

In addition, Chatham's PAS program is fully committed to making your experience—from finding out more about becoming a preceptor to handling any issues that may arise—as seamless, smooth, and positive as possible.
